# Five years of Doing Good

### **\$8,562,620** Our Social Impact

Over five years our community commitment has been central to our purpose. Our total social impact figure includes the Do Good Fund, community investment and volunteering during business hours.

#### Community Investment **\$3,063,402**

This total figure includes the benefits that people who bank with us share, community programs, micro-financing, fundraising, donations, sponsorship, environmental initiatives and volunteering.

#### **255** Lives

We support the Australian Red Cross Blood Service program, Red 25. Together we rolled-up our sleeves, helping to save 255 lives over the past 18 months.





### Volunteering **8,447 hours**

In a challenging environment our team continued to volunteer their time to support charities, community groups and not-for-profits, some as part of a corporate volunteering program, the rest in their own time. Together we've clocked up 8,447 hours over 18 months. In the last three and a half years the number of volunteering hours has grown to 26,565 hours, that's around 196 hours per team member.

#### Community Grant Program **\$34,871**

In the past 18 months BDCU's Community Partner Program has donated \$34,871 to community causes in the NSW Southern Highlands and Tablelands.

The Program includes a My Community Savings account that allows members to nominate and support community partners from a list of registered local charities, community groups, schools and other local organisations. For every \$1 of interest earned by members, BDCU donates 15 cents from its own capital to the member's nominated charity.

### Outstanding Achievement Award

#### Liam Foldi and Kenshi Candles

Kenshi Candles is a social enterprise that has raised over \$50,000 directly funding projects in Australia, Kenya, Sri Lanka, Papau New Guinea and Myanmar. The business works with the Chin refugee community in Melbourne to produce the candles.

Founder, Liam Foldi explains, "As a young person growing up in a wealthy city like Melbourne, I found that most people want to help others, but the hectic demands of life can make it hard to give back regularly. Kenshi is about enabling people that want to make a real difference raise thousands of dollars."





### Do Good Community Award Collin Peebles

Collin Peebles is the CEO of the Geelong Food Relief Centre, a not-for-profit Food Bank that provides emergency food relief to around 37,000 people in the region. The organisation is supported by 90 volunteers and partners with a range of welfare agencies.

The bushfires of last summer and the COVID-19 pandemic has placed greater demand on the Food Bank, so Collin delivered food hampers to those in isolation as far away as Colac. Collin and his team had supported approximately 50,000 people by the end of 2020.





### Do Good Business Award

#### Technology for Ageing and Disability ACT (TADACT)

Technology for Ageing and Disability ACT (TADACT), designs and customises assistive equipment for people that is not available commercially or, requires modification to better suit a person's needs.

This small, not-for-profit organisation assists around 400 families each year in the Canberra region. Manned by 60 volunteers whose skills range from engineering to sewing, and four part-time staff members, they are making an enormous difference to people's lives.





### Do Good Team Award Got Your Back Sista

Got Your Back Sista works with women and their children experiencing domestic violence - many whom are at risk of living below the poverty line. The charity provides a pathway from refuge accommodation to sustainable independent housing and employment.

They aim to provide women with the tools to regain their confidence and the skills they need to be gain confidence and employment. They do this through workshops, a self-defence program, mentoring, re-skilling and providing employment opportunities.
